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Fall Leaf Removal 2008

The fall leaf removal program runs through mid-December 2008. Portland Street Maintenance crews perform limited leaf cleanup in areas with the high concentrations of mature street trees to help reduce slippery road conditions, increasing the safety of vehicles and pedestrians, and to reduce localized flooding caused by clogged drain inlets.

As in previous years, property owners are responsible for removing and disposing of fallen leaves on their property and from the sidewalks adjacent to their property.

The City asks all residents not to rake leaves into the street. Use your yard debris collection service, or take your leaves to the leaf depot sites for recycling for a nominal fee.

These depot sites will run through December 7, 2008 and are open on either Saturday or Sunday each weekend through Saturday, December 7, 2008. Go to the city of Portland web site for the 2008 Leaf Depot locations, times, dates, and fees. Schedule information will also be advertised in The Oregonian.

Neighborhood leaf removal service is provided in 17 neighborhoods with high concentrations of mature street trees, including Grant Park. Residents in the leaf removal neighborhoods will be notified in advance of their scheduled dates by a door hanger.

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Stormwater Drainage

Portland receives an average of 37 inches of annual precipitation, creating about 20 billion gallons of stormwater runoff per year that can cause flooding and erosion, destroy natural habitat, and contribute to combined sewer overflows. Storm drains, ditches, trash racks, and culverts all are prone to blockage, and leaves are the prime culprit in the fall.

How you can help

1. Use a rake or pitch fork to clear leaves and debris from catch basins so that water can drain.
2. Do not rake leaves into the street. Pile them on the curb in the parking strip.
3. For leaves that have already collected on the street, at least 10-12 inches from the curb, allowing water to flow without carrying the leaves with it.
4. When you see City crews out working, please slow down, especially if there is standing water.
5. Watch carefully for pedestrians and bicyclists, who may be in the street to avoid a flooded corner. Darkness limits everyone's visibility.

If you believe an emergency response is necessary, because you cannot clear your street drain, call Transportation Maintenance at 503-823-1700 to report the clogged catch basin.

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
Grow a Garden Campaign

After months of planning, Fernwood campus will be breaking ground on Beverly Cleary School Learning Garden in January. The Garden will be for neighbors, school children, their parents and teachers to learn about science and nature in an outdoor classroom. The completed project will encompass raised beds, irrigation, gravel pathways, fence and gate, benches and tool shed with a green roof.

Some of the needed items:

- untreated Cedar 2" x 4" for raised beds
- someone to construct raise beds
- sand and gravel for pathways
- irrigation supplies and assistance with installation
- design and construct of a tool shed with green roof
- benches, fence and gate
- permeable pavers
- trees

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Neighborhood Tree Planting!

Join the GPNA, in partnership with Friends of Trees, to plant street trees in Grant Park neighborhood.

Why Plant a Tree?

- Trees contribute to neighborhood livability, reducing noise and glare, and calming traffic.
- Houses on tree-lined streets are valued up to 20% higher than houses in other neighborhoods.
- Trees reduce the energy needed to heat and cool our homes by 15-35%.
- Trees help remove CO² from the atmosphere.
- Trees reducing stormwater runoff.

What will you get?

You'll get a city-approved tree 1.25" - 2" in diameter (6'-14' tall) for your parking strip for as little as \$70 per tree. You will also be get stakes, ties, and labels, as well as follow-up monitoring of your tree.

Participants are asked to help plant trees on planting day, or to participate in some other way. Trained volunteers will assist with digging and planting.

“Neighborhood Diaries” Project

An artist in Portland is beginning a new project titled “Neighborhood Diaries” that has to do with our neighborhoods, specifically the Buckman, Boise, Downtown, Northwest, and King/Vernon neighborhoods. He is recording the location-based memories of residents like you and me, and then making free “walking-tour” podcasts that guide listeners through these neighborhoods and communicate the rich, emotional history that make up our surroundings.

In order to do this, he needs people to (anonymously) volunteer their memories. He can meet people anywhere they would like to record their memories with his mobile recording rig as long as it is after 6 on weekdays, or anytime on the weekend. No memory is too small or too large, too short or too long.
