## Grant Park Neighborhood Clean-Up, May 15, 2010

Once again this year, there will be a Neighborhood Clean Up on May 15th from 9 am to 1 pm, held in the parking lot of Grant Park Church, located at 2728 NE 34th Avenue.

We are asking only \$10 per car load and \$20 per pick-up load, but our funding limits the number of drop boxes so when they are full the clean-up will have to close. There will be an extra \$3 fee for large loads of yard debris.

There will be separate drop boxes for general waste and for yard debris. Other vendors will also be available to recycle or reuse your unwanted items including scrap metal, and building material. There will be areas for swapping/selling other items. You can save a lot of trouble and effort by separating or grouping your materials as you load your vehicle.

### Yard Debris

The rules for yard debris are similar to your curbside rules: no rocks, stumps; metal, plastic, branches more than 4 thick, animal waste, garbage, dirt, or sod. You can add unpainted and untreated wood but not plywood or particle board.

### Building Materials

Building materials should be sound and free of major defects. Lumber should be at least four feet long without nails. For more about what is acceptable check out [www.rebuildingcenter.org/donations.htm](http://www.rebuildingcenter.org/donations.htm)

### Scrap Metal

Scrap metal will be collected by LJs

Metal Hauling Service. He will be on site and have business cards available and if people have things that are too heavy, he can arrange to pick it up.

### Don't Bring

- Please do not include your regular household garbage.
- **NO** hazardous waste: (paint, pesticides, fertilizer, disinfectants)
- **NO** batteries
- **NO** motor oil
- **NO** medical waste.
- **NO** tires
- **NO** electronics (TVs, computer monitors, phones)
- **NO** refrigerators.

### FOR ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED

#### Hazardous Waste:

Can be taken to Metro Central Station, 6161 NW 61st Ave., from 9 am to 4 pm, Monday - Saturday. There is no fee for hazardous waste from your home. For information, call Metro Recycling Information at 503-234-3000.

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## Grant Field Improvement Update

There was a hearing at City Hall on a proposal on a Memorandum Of Understanding (MOU) to allow a group called Friends of Grant Athletics to begin fund raising for installation of artificial turf in Grant Bowl and the Upper Baseball/Soccer fields.

Our President, Geoff Hyde, testified for the GPNA Board of Directors to raise our concerns about whether the Parks Public Involvement Guidelines were followed, the timing of the project with the high school restructuring and the \$2,000,000 the schools have set aside for high school field renovation and health and safety concerns of synthetic versus natural turf.

The end result was that the most Commissioners stated that they will vote in favor of the MOU at next weeks meeting. Commissioner Leonard said he would also support further improvements including lights and seating to allow Grant to play its home games in the Bowl and Commissioner Fish spoke in favor of increased club soccer use.

Most people testifying pointed out that synthetic fields were common in the suburbs and it created an inequity for local teams who have to play and practice on natural turf.

As the Village Building Convergence (VBC) enters its second decade, we are asking our community to think about and create deeper intersections in their lives and in the world around them.

How can the private and the public be effectively merged to co-create the world we want to live in? How can modern technology and traditional methods work symbiotically instead of being at odds with each other? Are the ways in which we conduct our interpersonal relationships conducive to building communities? How do we create diverse communities that support and nurture the uniqueness of each member?

Village Building Convergence events are a bit like a conference, a bit like a festival, and a bit like a neighborhood improvement day.

During the Village Building Convergence, there are workshops and keynote speakers. There are activities from early morning until late in the night. Many people register to attend the entire event. Participants celebrate public art and lavishly decorate the central venue, eat dinner together every night, and feature local bands nearly every night. Attendees at VBC are integrally involved in creating the “content” (the placemaking site projects), and as such, it is more of a convergence of interested, skilled, experienced and committed people, of both those living in Portland, and visitors from afar.

During the Village Building Convergence, a lot of work is done to directly improve spaces which the public either owns or has access to. Each project is initiated and managed by neighborhood groups with support from the VBC Placemaking Committee. People feel more ownership of the place in which they live. We’re rebuilding vibrant neighborhoods!

Admission charged for the evening event is used to support the non-profit Village Building Convergence, which in turns assists the neighborhood placemaking sites with materials and other support.

## You Change Your Clocks. Did you Check Your Smoke Alarm?

For years, "Change your clock, change your smoke alarm battery" was the advice from your firefighters. New technology has changed that. Portland Fire & Rescue suggests you don't just check your smoke alarm but that you install a new smoke alarm with a 10-year lithium battery.

Any smoke alarm that is more than 10 years old has lost much of its effectiveness and should be replaced. Oregon law requires that any new smoke alarm sold or installed in Oregon must contain a lithium battery that is expected to last up to 10 years. After that don't just replace the battery, replace the entire unit. New alarms are simply not designed to work for longer than the 10-year life span.

The new smoke alarms also have a "Hush Button". This button will silence the alarm when nuisance smoke or shower steam accidentally set it off. Pushing the button will silence the device for up to 15 minutes before it resets itself. By installing a new smoke alarm with the "Hush Button", you will never forget to put the battery back in after a nuisance activation.

Smoke alarms continue to provide your best protection against dying in a fire. Most fires occur in the home and the greatest risk is when you are sleeping. A working smoke alarm significantly increases your chances of surviving a deadly home fire. Protect yourself and your loved ones by checking your smoke alarm today.

Remember to:

- Test all smoke alarms each month.
- Install a smoke alarm on each level of your home, near sleeping areas and inside each bedroom.
- Have and practice a home escape plan.
- Remember to help elderly relatives and friends check their alarms after you check yours.

## Save Our Elms

*"Working to preserve the urban forest"*

If you've strolled around the neighborhood lately, you may have noticed the sudden loss of four mature American elms trees on NE 41st Ave., just north of Knott, reminding us that Dutch elm disease (DED) is alive and well and seriously threatens the few remaining majestic American elm trees.

Many streets in older neighborhoods like ours were once lined with elms that created a continuous, high, wide canopy. While healthy elms can live for hundreds of years, the presence of DED means they desperately need our help if they are to survive.

There are many public values inherent in these large trees including the protection of air quality, the cleansing of stormwater, the energy efficiency aspects of natural reduction of heat loss in buildings and cooling during warm periods, noise reduction and increased privacy. In addition we receive the habitat value, the beauty of having some green environment where we live, and the 8% to 10% increase in housing assessed value when trees are present.

There is a Grant Park affiliate of Save Our Elms (SOE), 2625 NE 41st Avenue, Portland, Oregon 97214. SOE is a non-profit, all-volunteer organization that works to preserve mature elms in Portland and replant disease-resistant elm varieties, is raising funds for inoculations and planting.

Elms are inoculated every three years so. On June 19, 2010 we'll be inoculating approximately fifty American elms in our neighborhood. Contributions and volunteers are needed. To get involved, please contact Angela at 503-281-2738.

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
## Grant Park Church

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## Ride Connection Needs Volunteers

Ride Connection is a nonprofit, service organization created in 1988 to link accessible, responsive transportation to meet the need for the elderly and persons with disabilities to have transportation. Ride Connection coordinates over 30 providers and schedule's over 358,000 rides for more than 10,500 individuals annually.

Ride Connection is seen as the center of the wheel that moves throughout our communities, offering essential transportation in a coordinated, collaborative, stable and reliable manner, keeping older adults and people with disabilities independent and mobile.

Ride Connection is recruiting volunteer drivers to serve in your neighborhood and beyond. The volunteer driver's role is to provide necessary transportation services to older adults and people with disabilities in the tri-county area who are unable to drive and access public transportation for various needs, often for life-sustaining purposes.

Volunteer drivers provide transportation in a Ride Connection vehicle or in their own personal vehicle to medical/dental appointments, shopping, volunteering and other personal business. This service enables these individuals to continue to live independent, quality lives. Last year over 370,000 rides were provided to customers through Ride Connection and its partner agencies.

Recruiting volunteers in our neighborhood is essential.

Ride Connection's Mobility Trainers provide one-to-one travel training on all transportation options in our community. The RideWise program educates individuals to use all services more effectively.

## Phase II of the Portland Plan

Feedback is being sought on goals and objectives for Portland. Phase Two Portland Plan survey, which focuses on a selection of proposed objectives for the city for 2035. The survey asks Portlanders to look ahead 25 years and imagine what's possible. What kinds of big, ambitious changes should we aim for to make this a better place?

Residents are asked to rate the proposed objectives as being too aggressive, not aggressive enough or just right. Questions address issues such as housing and transportation costs, living wage jobs, home energy use, healthy watersheds and education.

The draft objectives were developed from community input during visionPDX, Phase I of the Portland Plan, outreach, and extensive research contained in the Portland Plan background reports. Teams of City staff and technical experts analyzed the information to develop this set of draft objectives for public input. A broader set of objectives will be presented at the Phase Two workshops, which begin on April 26th and run through May 18th. The Portland Plan will be the City's road map for the next 25 years, guiding our direction as the city grows and changes. Portlanders are encouraged to bring their friends and families and join their neighbors to make their mark on Portland's future.

### Date and Time

This year the parade will be Wednesday, June 9th, at 1 pm. Parade participants may begin to gather as early as 11 am in the formation areas.

### Formation and Disband Areas

The formation area includes eight square blocks between NE Sacramento & 57th and NE Tillamook & 53rd. Normandale Park is also used for bands and dance units. Grant Park is the disband area.

### Parade Route

The parade begins at NE Sandy & 52nd and marches down NE Sandy to NE 40th where the parade turns right. At NE Tillamook the parade turns left. It ends at NE Tillamook & 36th and disbands at Grant Park. The parade route is approximately one mile long.

### Street Closures

Sandy Blvd is closed beginning at 11:30 am. The rest of the parade route is closed around 12:30 pm. The parade generally lasts until approximately 3:30 pm.

### Spectators

The Fred Meyer Junior Parade attracts hundreds of spectators who line the streets, often setting up lawn chairs or just sitting on the sidewalk. Seating and parking can be very tight, so we encourage the use of public transportation. Spectators should also remember to be prepared for the weather.

### Clean-Up

The Portland Rose Festival is proud to be the "Cleanest and Greenest Festival in America." The Festival makes every effort to provide ample garbage containers in the formation areas and to encourage participants to keep our parks and streets clean. They want to thank the city of Portland and the Hollywood Boosters for assisting in these efforts!

## A Call for Clean-Up Volunteers

If you would like to get involved, we would love to have you. Volunteers should bring work gloves and wear protective clothing and footwear. We will also have free food and beverages for volunteers!!

In the past we had quite a few Grant High School volunteers and several families have expressed interest in volunteering. We are overjoyed at the interest the students and the community have taken in this event.

Parents, working side by side with their children, send such a strong message about the care and value that we place on our environment. At the same time we must be cautious about issues of safety at the clean up.

There is constant vehicular traffic; cars and trucks are backing up; drop boxes are being loaded and unloaded; people are tossing items. Sometimes there is broken glass or pieces of sharp metal. This is not a safe site for young children. We are happy to have adult and high school volunteers. Middle school students are welcome if accompanied by a responsible adult. Sorry, we do not feel that elementary age students can be safely monitored.
