#### **Grant Park Village Update**

Construction is well under way at the old Albina Fuel site, renamed Grant Park Village. This first phase is scheduled to be finished in Fall 2014.

As a part of this project, Capstone Partners LLC obtained permission to install a light at the corner of 32nd Ave and Broadway. The signal will be timed to coordinated with other signals on Broadway. It will also have a left-turn from Broadway option. GPNA wrote a letter in support and testified in favor of the zoning change that will allow the signal after considering the issue at a regular meeting.

Current plans are to reconfigure NE Broadway between 32nd and 33rd so that there is a continuous turn lane between NE 32nd & 33rd. Currently, eastbound left-turn queues from the traffic signal at NE 33rd Ave often extend beyond the available storage, impeding eastbound through traffic. The reconfiguration should help eliminate this problem.

#### **Speed Reduced on Knott**

As was noted in the summer GPNA newsletter. multiple neighborhood groups have expressed concerns about speeding cars on NE Knott St and the resulting risks to pedestrian safety and the degradation of the neighborhood. With few stop signs, and no traffic lights, this stretch of Knott is often seen by drivers as a much more efficient route than nearby arterial streets.

A petition to reduce the 30 mph speed limit on NE Knott St west of NE 33rd Ave was circulated by concerned neighbors, and widely supported in the affected area.

The issue was discussed at the June GPNA meeting where a letter of support for the proposal to decrease the speed limit to 25 mph on that stretch of NE Knott was unanimously approved. The issue was then taken before the NE Coalition of Neighborhoods Transportation and Safety Committee, where the proposed change was also unanimously supported.

With this support, the grass roots efforts of these neighborhood groups have convinced the Portland Department of Transportation (PDOT) to reduce the designated speed on this section of Knott. New 25 mph speed limit signs are already in place.

This is a small victory for safety and livability in our neighborhood, and it is a start, but it is clear that many vehicles still treat NE Knott St as a highway rather than a street in a residential neighborhood.

Efforts are being undertaken throughout the city to improve the quality of neighborhoods through traffic calming. Let's hope we can all continue to share our ideas and efforts, and working together we can make all of our neighborhoods more livable.

#### **Vandalism in the Neighborhood**

Recently, in multiple eastside neighborhoods, including Grant Park, residents are reporting tire puncture vandalism. Most commonly, the street-side tires are punctured on the sidewall, making them impossible to repair.

Remember these tips to keep your vehicles secure:

- If possible, park off-street and/or in a garage.
- Keep your car locked and empty a "showroom clean" car is much less likely to be broken into.
- Keep an eye on your neighborhood. If you are up early or late, take a look outside your windows.
- · Leave your porch lights on at night.
- If you see suspicious persons or activity call the police non-emergency number at 503-823-3333, and try to get a good description of the suspect.
- If the person is presenting as a threat to you or neighbors, call 911 immediately.
- · Always report any crime in progress to 911.

#### **Preventative Street Maintenance**


This summer, the Portland Bureau of Transportation (PBOT) is planning to repair and seal several streets in NE Portland, including in the Grant Park neighborhood as part of its "Back to Basics" street maintenance program. The thousands of miles of streets in the City of Portland comprise an asset worth nearly \$5 billion. The PBOT maintenance program for 2013-14 intends to maintain more than 100 lane miles of city streets with a variety of treatments. With a new policy approved by the City Council, the Bureau plans to work on residential streets for the first time in four years.

Maintenance crews will first clean the streets, seal cracks in the pavement, and make minor surface repairs. In a later visit, crews will apply a "fog seal" to the street surface. Affected residents will be provided with direct notice before work begins, and streets will be closed while this work is being performed. Before work starts, vehicles parked on the street will need to be moved, and other obstructions such as piles of dirt or dumpsters will need to be cleared.

#### **NE/SE 20's Bikeway Planning**


The Portland Bureau of Transportation (PBOT) will begin developing design recommendations this fall for the NE/SE 20's Bikeway, which extends 9.1 miles from N Lombard St to the Springwater Corridor. This is a major piece of the City's north-south bicycle network. Thanks to a \$2.5 million federal grant, the project will provide improvements that will interconnect the existing pieces of the route.

North of NE Broadway the route follows NE 28th/ 29th and 27th Aves which are local residential streets. Key issues here include potential need for traffic calming and how to improve crossing safety of the major east-west collector streets.

South of NE Broadway, the route uses 28th Ave to cross the freeway and makes its way south towards existing bicycle lanes on SE 26th Ave south of SE Clinton St. Higher traffic volumes in this section, point out the potential need for bicycle lanes or alternative alignments to avoid on-street parking impacts.

To help develop the recommendations, PBOT will be assembling a Stakeholder Advisory Committee made up of neighborhood and business representatives, along with other groups. PBOT is currently looking for a representative to serve on this committee from the Grant Park Neighborhood. This phase of the project is expected to run from early fall to winter, with 4 - 6 evening meetings. 

#### **Tips for Waterwise Gardening**

The Regional Water Providers Consortium (RWPC) has some great free resources to help save water while keeping our gardens green and healthy in the dry summer months. The first step is knowing how much water your garden needs. The Consortium makes that easy by posting a "Weekly Watering Number" (www.conserveh2o.org) that tells you exactly how many inches of water you for the week, based on the weather in your zip code. You can even sign up to receive the watering number by e-mail.

Here are the RWPC's "Top Five" waterwise tips:

- 1. Water lawns and gardens early (before 10 am) or late (after 6 pm) when evaporation is minimized.
- 2. Adjust your sprinklers so that they are watering your lawn and garden, and not the street.
- 3. Water in several short sessions rather than one long session to allow for better absorption.
- 4. Raise your mower height to shade to the roots and help retain soil moisture.
- 5. Group plants with similar watering needs together.

#### A Carrotmob Can Help Save Bees?

A Carrotmob is about showing appreciation to businesses that are doing the right thing. Garden Fever is a neighborhood garden shop that has agreed to take all neonicotinoid pesticides off their shelves. Neonics are highly toxic to bees because they are absorbed by the plant and accumulate in pollen and nectar. When bees collect the pollen or nectar, they are poisoned. This is what happened in Wilsonville recently, when 50,000 bumblebees died.

Garden Fever has agreed to stop selling neonics, so let's show our appreciation. Get on your bee colors and join our Carrotmob on October 6. We'll have information about honey bees, native bees and how to grow a bee-friendly garden.
