Another Successful Spring Clean Up Fundraiser

Grant Park Neighborhood Association's annual Spring Clean Up was held on Saturday, April 30th. We served at least 160 households from Grant Park and Sullivan's Gulch neighborhoods, netting more than \$1800. After covering expenses (hauling, cleaning the parking lot, advertising), we raised about \$900. This money will be given out as grants supporting community projects and organizations contributing to making Grant Park a nice place to live - grant applications are available on our website, www.grantpark-na.org.

We partnered with the Sullivan's Gulch Neighborhood Association for the first time this year. It meant that we had more traffic through the event, but with the additional volunteers we were able to handle the volume without a noticeable difference in wait times. There was no significant impact on funds raised for GPNA, and it was nice to get to know neighbors south of Broadway.

In numbers, we reused and repurposed countless items from our FREE area (pictured above). We recycled 4500 lbs of scrap metal, 1234 lbs of miscellaneous electronics, an estimate 80-100 lbs of batteries, two boxes of CFL light bulbs, 24 tires, and we disposed of 5-40 yard bins of bulky waste.

One notable challenge for our organizers was linked to Metro tightening up restrictions on potential asbestos containing materials, due to new DEQ rules. The rules are meant to protect Metro workers and neighborhood volunteers and we support the policy. However, the edict came late in our planning process and we could have done a better job with communicating banned materials, if we had the information sooner. We apologize to those neighbors who brought materials we could not accept.

Better Block Broadway Project

Those venturing onto Broadway between 7th and 24th Avenues during the week of May 9-15 found a lot of changes.

Better Block, a national group devoted to creating "complete streets" urban redevelopment by creating demonstration projects to engage the public, added a protected bicycle lane, changed the location of north side parking, and built a bus stop one lane away from the current location. In addition, there were cross walks at each intersection, and some curbside business extensions from existing businesses. Better Block partnered with BWA to stage the project.

The street redesign ideas provoked a lot of discussion, both pro and con, and Better Block made some refinements as the week progressed to better demonstrate the changes proposed.

Imagining a Better Broadway

Complaints concerning the Broadway business corridor are frequent and many (speeding cars, dangerous street crossings, inadequate public transit options, bicycle challenges, lack of consumer friendly streetside amenities, such as outside tables). Despite widespread agreement on at least some of the challenges faced when trying to improve Broadway, reaching consensus on how to do so is elusive.

Yet more than 70 residents and business owners tried to do just that on May 14 at the Better Broadway charrette sponsored by the Broadway-Weidler Alliance (BWA), a group of both neighborhood and business associations adjoining Broadway. This was its first large public engagement event.

Attendees heard from Metro Councilor Sam Chase, who spoke about the Climate Smart Strategies program developed to guide future regional transportation changes. Dan Bower from Portland Streetcar Company talked about a possible streetcar line on Broadway-Weidler and provided an update on streetcar economic benefits, financing options, and the national increase in metropolitan areas now using streetcars. Did you know that Portland once had over 200 miles of streetcar lines?

Following the speeches, attendees could visit topic specific tables staffed by Alta Planning & Design (a bicycle advocacy group), Better Block (a volunteer group that stages temporary street installations, to provide examples of possible changes), Oregon Department of Transportation, Oregon Walks, Portland Bureau of Planning and Sustainability, Portland Bureau of Transportation, Portland Streetcar Company, and TriMet. BWA plans to complete a report following the event that will be available on its website for review.

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GPNA to Seek Membership in CNN

At April's Annual Meeting, GPNA voted to seek membership in the Central Northeast Neighbors (CNN), in place of its current affiliation with the Northeast Coalition of Neighborhoods (NECN). Each neighborhood organization in Portland is also a member of a larger group that seeks to represent the collective interests of geographically adjacent neighborhoods with similar issues and interests.

GPNA believes that current shared issues of traffic safety and congestion, Broadway revitalization, and school boundary issues, among others, make CNN a more appropriate "fit" than NECN. GPNA historically belonged to CNN for many years before changing to NECN during a time when crime and gang activities were major issues, and NECN had a program in place to deal with them.

Changing neighborhood coalitions is a multi-step process that must ultimately be approved by the Portland Office of Neighborhood Involvement (ONI). GPNA has completed most of the procedural process involved, but several steps remain.

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
